From the Corner Office "Rain Comes from the Clouds...

These lyrics from the iconic Soul and Blues singer, George Benson, sum up the three things in life that this songwriter thinks you can be sure of. In this "Everything Must Change" tune, the artist tells us that "nothing and no one stays the same". And I happen to completely agree with Brother Benson. The winds of change are surely swirling around here at LCYDC.

In addition to our residential programming for children and teens, LCYDC is quite proud of our community-based efforts geared toward mentoring, stabilizing and reunifying families. Some months ago we learned that our Intensive In-Home Services (IIHS) program which serves Lee and six other contiguous counties would need to evolve. We are pleased to have pivoted and are now partnering with these same seven counties to provide Family-Based Intervention Services (FBIS). This programming center coaches, counsels and serves children and families in their homes, schools and communities. Our team of professionals have been remarkable agents of change in this move from IIHS to FBIS service provision.

This change in community-based programming allowed us to both pivot and to also take the time needed to broaden and sharpen our thinking. LCYDC has always served all sixty-seven counties in our state with regards to residential care. However we have known for some time that the need for community based preventative intervention and Therapeutic Foster Home recruitment extends beyond East Alabama. We are therefore taking steps to expand our reach and our social service expertise to the Central and Southwest regions of our state. We are persuaded that we will be able to effectively partner with others to make meaningful impact in the lives of those who need us in these other areas of our great State.

As a matter of fact, this seems to be a opportune period to begin contemplating and executing change. Would you believe that this time next year, our agency will be commemorating 50 Years of service! That's right, more than fifty years ago our founders began the Lee County Council for Abused and Neglected Children. However, from the very start, our astute founders understood the need to evolve and change in order to remain current, relevant and effective. By 1973 the name had been changed to Lee County Youth Development Center and services began expanding and diversifying. Agencywide expansions and contractions – development and redevelopment - continue right up to this present day. Current Board members and agency leaders are considering a subtle company name change to coincide with our Golden Anniversary and better align our name with the current scope and range of our services.

Crooner George Benson also sings that "winter turns to spring...the young become the old and mysteries do unfold". And you know, that's both the exciting and the challenging part of change. We know where we have been; we understand where we are now; but we cannot know all the unknowns which come along with the changes to come. However – so long as rain comes from the clouds and sun lights up the sky you can be certain that LCYDC will remain current, nimble and prepared to withstand those changes which are in front of us. As always, with the support of our stakeholders, partners and supporters, we will press our way through.
